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
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SOUTH PETHERTON FOLK & CRAFT FESTIVAL



GENERAL INFORMATION

THE FESTIVAL INFORMATION CENTRE is situated in the Blake Hall in the square (1 on map). This is also the sales point for tickets, programmes, and some festival souvenirs. Please check with the office for additional events or any programme changes. Opening times are as follows:

Friday Midday - 9 p.m. Saturday 9 a.m. - 9 p.m. Sunday 9 a.m. - 6 p.m.

TICKETS Weekend and Family tickets may be obtained in advance from John Johnson, 24 Compton Road, South Petherton, Somerset. Tel: South Petherton 40411 or at the Festival Information Centre during the Festival. Day tickets can be bought for Saturday, and tickets for individual events will be available at the door space permitting.

PRICES One way of saving money is to buy the family weekend ticket - £33 for up to 2 adults and 2 children. The single weekend ticket will cost £14 this year, but you can save £1 on this by buying your ticket before May 31. Children and senior citizens half price as usual. The weekend ticket gives you admission to all events and includes camping on the festival site for the weekend. If you can only make it for part of the festival, then buy an all-day Saturday ticket at £8.00.

Prices for individual events are listed in the centre pages of the programme.

CRAFT MARKET & EXHIBITION The main Craft Market will be held at the Bus Garage (2 on map) and will open on Saturday 10.00-6.00 and Sunday 10.00-5.30.


This year we are hoping to include many more local craft exhibitors, including this year a blacksmith who will be demonstrating his craft during the weekend. Other crafts to be represented will include screen-printing, clogs, ceramics, woodwork, wooden toys and jewellery, basketwork, shoes, jewellery, earrings, knitwear, stained glass work, leather work and textiles. There will also be a plant stall, secondhand clothes stall, and a Record stall - selling records by many of the festival artists, as well as a wide range of folk and roots music records.

Admission is FREE, so don't miss this opportunity.

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
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FESTIVAL FOOD GUIDE

MILK will be sold on the camp site each morning. Also available from the two grocers, and from the garage at Lopen Head which is open all day Sunday.

BREAD available from HAWKINS bakery. Open until 1.00 p.m. on Saturday. Be warned they tend to sell out quite early. Also from the two grocers.

CO-OP opens until 1.00 p.m. on Saturday. Also open until 6.30 p.m. Friday evening. Usual range of supermarket goods. Enormous queues by 11.00 Saturday morning.

PILKINGTONS open all day Saturday.

WHOLEFOOD SHOP in the Square. Open all day Saturday. Stocks fruit, veg, some grocery items like fruit juice, baked beans, wide range of wholefoods and snacks.

Butcher CHURCHILLS open Saturday morning.

W.I. will run a cafe in the Lower Church rooms on Saturday and Sunday until 6.00 p.m. They will be serving teas, coffees, soft drinks, sandwiches, filled rolls, home-made cakes and biscuits etc.

FISH AND CHIP SHOP will open Friday evening, Saturday lunchtime until 1.30, Saturday evening from 5.00 to 10.00 p.m. As well as the usual 'British' take-away menu there is an extensive Chinese take-away menu.

THE OLD BAKEHOUSE will open specially to do festival breakfasts. There will be a choice of eggs, bacon, sausages, tomatoes, toast etc. There will also be additions to the usual lunch-time menu which will include pasties, sausages, fish, home-made steak and kidney pies etc. all with fresh vegetables or chips and peas. Sunday lunch will also be available.

THE BREWERS ARMS and THE WHEATSHEAF both do a good range of bar snacks - good choices if you want lunch with music.

Other licensed restaurants are LE TIRE BOUCHON in Palmer Street and BROOK HOUSE in Silver Street. BROOK HOUSE offers a range of good food during normal licensing hours together with an 'all day' breakfast service.

If you wish to go further afield there are numerous country pubs in the area which serve excellent meals, or you could try Yeovil which has Indian and Chinese restaurants, various take-aways and a number of Sunday opening shops.

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MEET THE ARTISTS



**** DEMBO KONTE & KAUSU KUYATEH ****

The phenomenal success of Paul Simon's 'Gracelands' album did much to broaden Western interest in African music. What very quickly became evident was the sheer wealth and variety of music in that vast continent. Whereas most of Simon's musicians were from Zimbabwe and South Africa, however, our guests this weekend are from West Africa.

Dembo Konte is from the Gambia, and his younger brother-in-law, Kausu Kuyateh is from southern Senegal, and both are masters of the kora, the traditional instrument of West Africa. The kora is somewhere between a lute and a harp. Traditionally it had 21 strings, although some of the younger kora players, Kausu included, have been experimenting with extra strings. It is made from a gourd resonator covered by stretched cowskin and has a rosewood neck around which are twisted leather tuning thongs. The kora is the best known of the instruments of the 'Jalis' - the hereditary musicians of West Africa, whose songs reach back across six centuries to the days of the great Malian empire.

If Dembo Konte is the traditional master of the kora, Kausu Kuyateh is one of the younger innovators on the instrument. Their music is magical, its rhythms hypnotic and its mood one of sheer exhilaration. This is their second visit to Britain, and after a highly successful and largely sold-out tour in 1987 we are delighted that South Petherton Festival is to be one of their first dates on the 1988 tour. Saturday is the day to see them here.



**** CYRIL TAWNEY ****

In response to numerous requests over recent years we are delighted to welcome one of the West Country's favourite sons back to the area. Cyril Tawnev's role as a folk singer evolved as an offshoot of his activities in the Navy. In early 1959 he became the only regular serviceman ever to have his own fully networked TV show. Eventually he decided to buy himself out and embark on a professional folksinging career. He made a special study of West of England folk songs and maritime songs, and in the early 60s staged what amounted to a singlehanded folk revival in the West Country, becoming himself the inspiration for scores of young singers. For 25 years his traditional songs and his own legendary compositions have delighted audiences everywhere. Cyril's public appearances are now something of a rarity, as he has concentrated more on his writing in recent years, so we are particularly pleased that he has accepted our invitation to come to South Petherton this year.

**** CLIVE GREGSON & CHRISTINE COLLISTER ****

After their all too brief appearance at last year's festival, we had no hesitation in seeking to bring Clive and Christine back again this year, although again it is for ONE appearance only, so don't miss them on SUNDAY after-

Clive Gregson came to prominence as writer, singer and guitarist with his rock band Any Trouble. The band split at the end of 1984 and it was as a result of Gregson recording his solo album 'Strange Persuasion' and touring with Richard Thompson's reformed band, that his partnership with Christine came about. She was spotted by Gregson on the folk club circuit. From there Richard Thompson enlisted them both into his band in 1985 and it was his suggestion that they should form a duo between tours. From that point on their popularity on the club circuit developed at a frantic rate, and by 1987 they had appeared at all the major festivals, and had had their own shows at the Shaw Theatre, Queen Elizabeth Hall, and the Bloomsbury Theatre. Christine's stunning vocal ability is the perfect vehicle for many of Clive's sensitive and poignant songs, and their inspired harmony work is often breathtaking, since Clive is also a fine and powerful singer. At the beginning of 1988 their new album 'Mischief' topped the Folk/Roots charts for weeks.

Chris is another influential singer and guitarist whom we have tempted out of retirement to appear at Petherton in 1988. Not that he is in any way a stranger to the area being himself a Yeovil lad, and a product of the old Yeovil folk club. To show just how highly other professionals rate Chris, we quote what June Tabor said of him on his LP 'Layers'. "If I had to find one word that epitomises Chris as a performer I think it would be 'quality'. His singing and playing is so rich in so many things that I can listen time and time again and discover something new. He has a distinctive voice, deep but clear with a faint overlay of his native Somerset, and a vocal style that incorporates a subtle use of decoration with an intricate and exciting sense of rhythmic patterns. His guitar playing is a similar blend of technical skill and rhythmic expertise with a hint of ragtime.

**** SIMON EDWARDS ****

Simon Edwards has been playing button accordion since the age of ten, and has now become a familiar face at clubs and festivals all over the country. In 1985 he gave a memorable performance alongside Kathryn Tickell and Blowzabella's Nigel Eaton in the Young Tradition concert at the South Bank Summer Festival. Shortly afterwards he joined the infamous Boothill Foottappers for their winter tour, including several John Peel and Janice Long sessions.

Since leaving the Boothills, Simon continued to play and record with a variety of rock bands. Now at the age of 19 he has decided to return to his roots, and after a period of rehearsal has emerged as one of the finest solo button accordion players around. Already he has supported the likes of Richard Thompson, Michelle Shocked, The Balham Alligators, The Oyster Band etc. Petherton will be buzzing before the weekend's out.

THE BANDS - with the re-introduction of the marquee on the Recreation Ground as the main dance venue we are hoping that we will have overcome one of the main problems that has dogged the Festival in recent years - lack of space in which to stage ceilidhs and dances.

The emphasis in 1988 has moved slightly towards the dance events, and we have therefore booked three of the best dance bands in the country in GAS MARK V, EDWARD II & THE RED HOT POLKAS, and JUICE ON THE LOOSE. Gas Mark V and Juice on the Loose will be appearing on Friday in the marquee and the Blake Hall respectively, and Edward II will lead the main ceilidh on Saturday night.

Back in the murky days of the mid-1970s, the New Wave of English Country Music came along and aimed a firm boot at the rear end of the sedate world of country dancing. Fairly speedily three bands laid down the ground-rules to be followed later by hundreds of others: The Old Swan Band in the west, The New Victory Band in the north, and Flowers and Frolics (cockney rhyming slang, you know!) in trendy down-town Islington.

When Flowers finally broke up, founder Dan Quinn and three later members Trevor Bennett, Rob Gifford and Nick Havell were joined by Chris Taylor (who had recently left The Oyster Band) in a new outfit called Gas Mark V, now fully established in their own right on the dance circuit. Gas Mark V moves on a step or two from Flowers in that it plays with a flexible and varied style that is deliberately designed to be more accessible to the man in the street brought up on the Beatles, American rock 'n' roll, reggae, or any of the current popular musical forms.



**** JUICE ON THE LOOSE ****

After the blistering start given to last year's festival, it was unanimously decided to invite Juice back again this year. Juice on the Loose have been one of London's leading R & B bands for 10 years, and have also built up a strong local following in this part of the world through their many successful appearances at The Bell at Ash. The band was formed in 1978 as a flexible line-up of mus-

icians to provide London with its own house band, primarily to back visiting American rhythm n' blues singers. But the band rapidly acquired popularity in its own right, the line-up crystallised, and Juice became one of the mainstays of the London R & B scene. None of the original members now remain in the band, but they are still capable of laying down a fat R & B /soul/blues sound second to none. In recent years however, the band's horizons have broadened. Their material is now largely self-penned, with singer/guitarist Andy Winfield proving to be a particularly accomplished writer. It is a mark of the band's accomplishment that their style is ever evolving, but their popularity continues to grow. Friday Night in the Blake Hall!



**** EDWARD II & THE RED HOT POLKAS ***

At first hearing it would be tempting to say that Edward II's music is very eclectic - with tunes from England, Scotland, Ireland, France, Sweden, Italy, Spain and America. Nonetheless closer listening will reveal that however varied the sources may be, the style - and therefore the music - displays a cohesive approach. The band's influences are as much Caribbean, Latin American and African as they are traditional English, but the result is a music unsurpassed for danceability. The band's recent record 'Let's Polkasteady' is one of the most interesting 'English' dance music records to surface for a long time. By their own definition Edward II have taken roots influence to an illogical conclusion and come up with a "mutant calypso/reggae/African-style English dance band. Not to be missed!



It was in this year that King John confirmed a weekly market and an annual fair each Midsummer day, the Festival of St.John the Baptist. although it is probable that these events had been held from Saxon days, and Midsummer day celebrations date from pre-Christian times. In 1252 the fair was extended to include the 'eve and morrow' and by 1294 was valued at 6s 8d. The fair's value continued to grow and in 1448 it was extended again, this time to six days. By 1650 its value had begun to decline, reaching 6s 8d again by 1701. When the Gregorian calendar was adopted in 1752 (some people imagined that they had been deprived of eleven days of their life) the fair, like many others, kept to old Midsummer Day - July 5th and continued on this day until the 1930s, when such was the interest, or rather lack of it, that tolls were levied merely for the sake of tradition. The old market house was demolished in 1843 and the replacement building can now be seen as part of the front section of the Blake Hall which was built in 1911. Today we have revived the celebrations of old by gathering together musicians, dancers and craftsmen for a Festival of traditional arts in and around South Petherton

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

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

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
