



## **MEET THE ARTISTS**

### The Bands

#### FOUR MEN AND A DOG

"FOUR MEN AND A DOG have appeared like a blast of fresh air — superb playing and an overwhelming sense of joy that just draws you in. The most exciting new Irish band I've heard in years". (Alan Bearman - Sidmouth Festival)

The sell-out appearance by FOUR MEN AND A DOG at the 1991 Belfast Folk Festival marked the end of a remarkable first year for the band who had made their debut at the 1990 event. In June 1991 the band's first album 'Barking Mad' was released to great critical acclaim. The ablum reached No. 2 in the Irish Folk Charts and went on to win the prestigious Folk Roots 'Album of the Year' Award — the first time ever for a debut album. The band came 2nd to The Saw Doctors in the RTE National Television awards and were runners-up in the 1992 Folk Roots readers' poll for 'Newcomers' of 1991.

FOUR MEN AND A DOG are the latest of a long line of Irish bands to emerge from a seemingly limitless number of breathtakingly brilliant musicians. There is the superb fiddle-

playing of **Cathal Hayden** who is also an excellent banjo player; wizardry from **Brian McGrath**, who is the group's regular banjo player, and driving rhythm of bodhran from **Gino Lupari**,together with his vocal conributions. Singer, songwriter, guitarist **Kevin Doherty** brings a new creative dimension to the band, and **Conor Keane** has been brought in to replace Donal Murphy on accordian.

There appearance at South Petherton is part of an exceptionally busy 1992, including work not only in Ireland and Britain, but also in Germany, Denmark, Belgium, Holland, Finland, Sweden, USA and Canada. We are delighted to see the band at South Petherton. Four Men And A Dog will be appearing on FRIDAY NIGHT ONLY.

#### ALIAS RON KAVANA

The Irish presence is further enhanced by the return of Alias Ron Kavana for Saturday night's bop, and the band is assured of a huge welcome. It was in 1987 that Ron first put his own name in front of a band and unleased a blend of original and outspoken songs played in a fusion of Roots styles. Ron has used the term 'Country & Irish' but it is much more than that. There are strong elements of Spanish, Latin-American and African influences at work, and most of all there is a rock-solid R&B style rhythm section driving the whole

thing, particularly the Irish medleys, with the precision and syncopation of a runaway steam train.

The present line-up has now been together for several years and has built up a devoted following - nowhere more so than in South Somerset where the band has played a series of memorable gigs — so it's a big welcome to Ron and to Mick Molloy (guitars), Richie Robertson (bass), Fran Byrne (accordian/percussion) and Les Morgan (drums). Since the band is neither very young, pretty or trendy, it must be their music which has won them so many accolades over the last few years. Since its last visit to South Petherton, the band has gone from strength to strength with its unique fusion of Celtic tradition and Irish rock. In the FOLK ROOTS readers' poll the band has twice been voted Top Live Performers in the last three years, and has twice been runners-up in the Best Group category. Ron Kavana has himself twice been runner-up in the Singer/Musician category behind Richard Thompson. In addition, the band's albums have regularly been high in the Albums Charts.

Alias Ron Kavana is just a terrific live band. Saturday will be a brilliant night — but watch out for the crack at other times too. Ron will also be doing a solo spot on Sunday afternoon.

#### ROD STRADLING with FECKLESS

For some twenty years **Rod Stradling's** trusty melodeon has been pumping away at the heart of this country's leading roots bands — Oak, The Old Swan Band, The English Country Blues Band, Tiger Moth and Edward II — with whom Rod has already played South Petherton twice in previous years. Despite his own modesty, Rod has been one of the most influential melodeon players around — a key figure in the New Wave of English Country Dance movement, out of which has sprung a whole generation of bands from The Oyster Band on down.

This year Rod returns with a highly acclaimed solo album to his name, and his new band Feckless for the Saturday ceilidh. After leaving Edward II Rod and his wife Danny decided to put together a band with a little less serious approach to life — hence the name Feckless. Feckless play loud, solid and totally accessible dance music from England, France, Italy and America, together with self-composed tunes. The line-up of Rod Stradling (melodeons), Phil Bird (guitar), Steve Crickett (drums), John Eastaugh (bass), Tony Engle (sax), Alan Lamb (all sorts), and Danny Stradling (percussion) is a 'Who's Who' from the bands already mentioned, plus The Late Night Band, Webb's Wonders, Three Straw Men, Crazy Hearts, Dr. Cosgill's Delight, and The Arizona Smoke Review, Wendy Lutley is the band's caller.

#### SKIN THE PEELER

Skin the Peeler are a popular Bristol-based six-piece acoustic multi-instrumental band playing what they have termed 'wild world roots music'. They play in their own distinctive style using jazz/classical/folk and contemporary textures — the result of which is a potent mix of rhythmic energy and haunting melody. The name of the band is also the title of an ancient Celtic melody, which ties in appropriately with the cross-cultural approach of the band in composing music inspired by many different sources.

"Skin the Peeler is an intricate web of explosive colour, a riot of carnival and jig, acoustic anarchy. Their recent World

Dance EP, reverential and rebellious in the same stroke, makes gorgeous listening"

Skin the Peeler are Terry Barter (Mandocello/Mandolin), Rod Salter (Sax/Flutes), Rose Hull (Cello), Jason Gaines (Percussion), Gerald Davis (Guitar), and Neil Russell (Drums). Although they are well-known in the area, this will be their first visit to South Petherton — watch out for sets on Saturday afternoon and evening.

## The Singers and Musicians JOHN KIRKPATRICK



John Kirkpatrick is one of this country's foremost folk musicians and without doubt its most famous and accomplished exponent of the 'squeezebox'. John's mastery of melodeon, concertina and accordian has been established for some twenty years and is internationally recognised. His various collaborations read like a 'Who's Who!' in the development of folk music — Steeleye Span, Richard Thompson, Martin Carthy, Brass Monkey, Sue Harris (Mrs Kirkpatrick in her alter ego), The Albion Band, Roy Bailey ... Recently his partnerships have embraced mainland Europe as well since he began a series of tours with two other melodeon masters: Riccardo Tesi of Italy and Marc Perrone of France.

John also works a great deal in the world of professional theatre, most significantly for the National Theatre in their productions of 'Lark Rise' and 'Candleford', but also for the New Victoria Theatre in Newcastle-under-Lyme and other leading provincial theatres.

When he's not doing that, he can be found dancing with the Morris team he formed **The Shropshire Bedlams**. Indeed this exciting and spectacular dance team epitomises everything that John Kirkpatrick stands for as a musician, performer and creative organiser.

John has probably received more invitations to South Petherton than any other artist. We are delighted that this time he can make it!

#### MARTIN CARTHY

For three decades Martin Carthy has enjoyed unrivalled status among solo singers on the British folk scene, yet not once has he chosen to rest on his laurels - for Martin, whether experimenting with a singing style or exploring a new instrumental technique, is one of folk's great innovators. Single-handedly he has created an English guitar style, which now has a host of would-be imitators. Martin has never been in the 'easy-listening' category, but the demands he makes on his audience are richly rewarded by his powerful interpretations of the ancient ballad stories to show their continuing relevance, or the delight in sharing the subtleties of traditional tunes. In recent years he has revived the legendary partnership with Dave Swarbrick. His current repertoire features both traditional and modern songs - many of the latter self-penned with a strong sense of social commitment - and Martin's music throws down a challenge to anyone sceptical about the lasting relevance of traditional music.

Martin is at South Petherton on SUNDAY ONLY.





#### DAMIEN BARBER

Damien Barber sings and plays traditional and contemporary music with a surprising maturity of style and sensitivity which belies his youthful 20 years. Already an accomplished melodeon player, he took up the English concertina 4 years ago to accompany his singing, and achieved such a high level of proficiency that he became a finalist in the prestigious 'Young Tradition' Awards in both 1989 and 1990. Damien has lived most of his life in his native Norfolk, and the influence of Norfolk traditional singers is very evident in his distinctive vocal style. He has picked up many of his songs from his father, and also names Walter Pardon and 'The Young Tradition' as other sources of inspiration. Damien draws on Irish and Scottish material for his excellent instrumental sets, playing with a crisp, clean and precise attack.

#### KEVIN MITCHELL

Kevin Mitchell is a diamond among singers. He was born in Derry City but moved to Glasgow in 1969 and has been based there ever since. He sings with the Glasgow group Stramash, and has an album on Topic entitled 'Free and Easy'. The title epitomises Kevin's unaccompanied style — he delivers the tradition in a way few others can do. This marvellously gifted and unassuming singer is modest, almost to a fault, but such gifted ability does not go unnoticed by other singers, particularly the professionals, amongst whom he is universally acclaimed. It is a privilege to welcome Kevin to South Petherton.

#### SHOW OF HANDS

Show of Hands is Phil Beer and Steve Knightley. Phil Beer is the multi-instrumentalist who, until recently, played guitar, fiddle and mandolin with The Albion Band. He has recorded with many of Britain's top roots, rock and acoustic artists, including Mike Oldfield, The Albion Band, Arizona Smoke Review, The Rolling Stones and Richard Thompson. He has recorded innumerable albums and established a reputation second to none as being the definitive sideman.

Steve Knightley's career as a songwriter spans some 15 years. His songs have been recorded by many artists, and capture the traditional flavour to such an extent that they have often been thought to be the real thing. Show of Hands offer instrumental virtuosity and great songs.

#### OTHER ARTISTS

There will no doubt be other artists performing this weekend. Some we don't know about yet, others will just turn up. To all of them we say 'Thanks!' — they all contribute greatly to the success of the weekend and the enjoyment of the Festival.

In addition to the invited guests, we should mention the crowd of local performers and friends of the festival who regularly give up their weekend to help run sessions, compere events, and generally keep everything going. Without their willing help it would be impossible to run the festival. In particular, thanks to John Waltham, Ian Findlay, Gerry Mogg, Dave Longley, Mike Hoskin, Dennis Preston, John Bagge, George Van Win .... and many others.

### The Dancers

The public perception of the festival atmosphere is due every year in no small measure to the colour and presence brought to the village by the visiting dance teams. But this is not just a spectator passtime — once again there will be workshops where you can learn and try the dances for yourselves — and of course on Saturday night there will be the usual popular ceilidh. Our visitors in 1992 are:

One Step Beyond Karpaty Polish Dancers Dawnswyr Tawerin Ros Keltek Stockport North West Morris Fosbrook Ladies Morris Chippenham Morris Woodfiddley

One of the most popular features at South Petherton and other Festivals in recent years has been the growing prominence of Appalachian Step Dancing or Clogging. **ONE STEP BEYOND** have been dancing togther for 3-4 years; are some 20 strong including dancers and musicians; have their own band **Two Steps Back**; and are based in Bromsgrove in Worcestershire. Appalachian Step Dancing comes from the Appalachian Mountain regions down the eastern side of the USA, in states such as Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee. It is a dance form that has evolved from the various dance forms brought to the region by immigrants from Ireland, England and central Europe, together with contributions from the native Cherokee Indians. The actual practice of wearing 'clogs' is a relatively recent innovation to the tradition.

The dance is primarily about sound patterns made with the feet—this may be done by a solo dancer, couples or a team using figures from Square or Big Circle dancing. Each team of dancers will be seeking to introduce new variations and their own innovations into known steps, for Appalachian Step Dancing is very much a living, developing tradition. If you fancy 'having a go' yourself, **One Step Beyond** will be running workshops on Saturday and Sunday.

The excitement and spectacle of the Eastern European tradition will be represented by the **KARPATY POLISH DANCERS** on a welcome return visit to South Petherton. The **Karpaty Polish**

Song and Dance Group was formed in 1955 and continues to keep alive the traditional songs and dances of Poland. Their dances, which date back to the 17th century, vary greatly — from the slow and stately 'Kujawiak' to the fast and frenetic 'Oberek' and 'Polka'. Their colourful costumes are of the authentic Krakowski design from Poland.



One Step Beyond

South Petherton Festival has evolved its own mini-tradition in almost always inviting a dance team from Wales. **DAWNSWYR TAWERIN** are making another welcome return visit to the Festival to present the colour and elegance of the Welsh tradition.

ROS KELTEK have also been to South Petherton several times before, but are none the less very welcome. Ros Keltek have represented Cornwall at numerous Celtic festivals over the years. Their name means 'Celtic wheel' and the specialise in the traditional dances of Cornwall, and some of the dances of other Celtic traditions.

STOCKPORT NORTH WEST MORRIS and FOSBROOK LADIES MORRIS are joint teams from Lancashire and will be presenting the various dance traditions from the North West of England. Stockport has a rich history of Morris dancing dating from the early 19th century when teams of dancers accompanied the Rushcart to the Parish church. The present group was formed in 1984 and took the name of a team which had last performed on the streets of Stockport around 1890. Stockport Morris Men have a varied repertoire of dances associated with the Lancashire Pennine and Plain mill towns, including both processional and display dances. Their vigorous style and energetic displays have been performed at festivals and fairs all over England, and, in June 1987, at Heilbronn in Germany.

**CHIPPENHAM MORRIS** perform the main Cotswold morris traditions together with a few Chippenham dances which they have 'discovered'. They have performed at numerous folk festivals and have just completed their second visit to Chippenham's twin town in

France, La Fleche, this May. They claim to be the only Morris team to boast a Hammer-Dulcimer playing Bagpiper among their ranks.

**WOODFIDDLEY** are old friends of South Petherton. Their aim is to share their enjoyment of some of the country and court dances from mediaeval times to the present day — and thus provide proof of the richness of the British social dance heritage.

## Dance Workshops

In addition to the Appalachian Step Dance workshops already mentioned the weekend offers two further opportunities for the 'doers' rather than the 'watchers' to take part.

On Saturday and Sunday, Val Knight from Wells, invites you to her IRISH SET DANCE WORKSHOPS. At first glance, the words, Irish Set Dancing, are often misread as Irish Step Dancing — so let's clear up any possible misapprehensions. Set Dancing is, in fact, a very old social dance — a square dance adapted by the people from the Sets of Quadrilles which came to Ireland from France. A set dance consists of four, five, or six parts known as figures. Each figure is performed either to reels, jigs, slides, polkas or hornpipes. Each figure is different and some have names which describe the move e.g. 'around the house and mind the dresser!' A natural break by the musicians and dancers occurs between the figures during the dance. A set can take twenty minutes to complete. Co. Clare is known for Reel Sets whilst Co. Kerry is famous for the Polka Set . . . so there you are — why not do it for yourself at Val Knight's workshops.

On the school field you will find continuous activities with shows throughout Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

The younger children have not been forgotten with a **creche**, **play bus and bouncy castle** waiting for them.

Our visiting entertainers this year are:

ROUGH MAGIC - well known in South Petherton for their giant puppets and sculptures, a feature of the Community Play in 1991. Rough Magic are running workshops in mask making, story telling, and drama games in The David Hall. Together with the famed NATHANIEL OF WESSEX, they will prepare children of all ages (this means you!) to take part in a colourful procession leading up to the Square on Sunday afternoon to perform their own kids show. Here is a wonderful chance for all budding performers to have a go with the expert guidance and help of professional community workshop leaders. WENDY and MICHAEL DACRE, fom Devon, have their roots in our Celtic heritage with traditional stories, songs and masks that delight in the weird and wonderful ... myths and legends ... They also have the skill to awaken our imagination and stimulate creative expression. NATHANIEL OF WESSEX will be working with ROUGH MAGIC — and telling a few stories of this own. He brings a host of story telling activities, including instant drama and adventure games once again designed to lead children to their own performance. Wherever he goes Nathaniel's boisterous and colourful performance engages rapt and delighted attention from his audience.



ARMCHAIR PUPPET THEATRE present their glove puppet performances and shadow puppet workshop. Armchair Puppet Theatre was created in 1988 by Jill and Ken Beagley who are both qualified artists and teachers with a community based experience. Their current glove puppet show 'Burglar Bill' will delight the whole family, but is particularly aimed at the 4 - 11 year olds. This lively show lasts just over half an hour, and includes an extra 'behind the scenes' viewing

Older children (from 7 years) and adults will enjoy their shadow puppet workshop where participants can share in the magic of shadow puppetry by making and performing with their own shadow puppets, as well as having an opportunity to watch several other short performances. You can find **Armchair Puppet Theatre** in the **Methodist Hall** on the corner of North Street.



The South Petherton Festival Craft Fair has become an attractive event in its own right in recent years, as it has expanded on the Junior School site, and it now attracts a large number of visitors from among the general public as well as the festival goers. This year the Craft Marquee has moved across the road to the larger site, which means that there will be more stalls and craftspeople than ever before. There is a performance area close to the marquee, where many of the dance teams will perform, and the street performers and children's events will also be in close proximity. The excellent refreshment service provided by the school PTA is once again available in the school hall, and there is some on-site catering as well.

The diverse range of crafts on show this year include:

Candles \* Raku Pottery \* Ceramics
Hand crafted jewellery \* Batik \* Brooches
Papier Mache decorations \* Handmade Shoes
Screen Printing \* Confectionery \* Preserves
Miniatures \* Textiles


#### **CRAFTS IN ACTION**



## A Festival since 1213

It was in this year that King John confirmed a weekly market and an annual fair each Midsummer day, the Festival of St John the Baptist, although it is probable that these events had been held from Saxon days, and Midsummer day celebrations date from pre-Christian times. In 1252 the fair was extended to include the 'eve and morrow' and by 1294 was valued at 6s 8d. The fair's value continued to grow and in 1448 it was extended again, this time to six days. By 1650 its value had begun to decline, reaching 6s 8d again by 1701. When the Gregorian calendar was adopted in 1752 (some people imagined that they had been deprived of eleven days of their life) the fair, like many others, kept to old Midsummer Day — 5th July and continued on this day until the 1930s, when such was the interest, or rather lack of it, that tolls were levied merely for the sake of tradition.

The old market house was demolished in 1843 and the replacement building can now be seen as part of the front section of the Blake Hall which was built in 1911.

Today we have revived the celebrations of old by gathering together musicians, dancers and craftspeople for a Festival of traditional arts in and around South Petherton.






